




A River Runs Through It

or meeting attendees, the San Antonio experience will likely be the charming walkways that line the San Antonio River Walk, with immediate access just outside the Grand Hyatt's doors. The River Walk is home to hotels, restaurants, shopping, entertainment, public art, and interesting folk from all parts of the world. There are funky bridges that allow you to cross from one side of the river to the other, or offer a view from above of the river boats and shuttles that navigate the waters. GoRio offers narrated cruises that are a fun way to learn a bit about the history of the area.

The <u>San Antonio Missions National Historical Park</u>, a World Heritage Site, features four early 1700s missions located along a six and a half mile trail adjacent to the San Antonio River. A fifth mission, Mission San Antonio Del Valero (The Alamo), is located in downtown San Antonio, about two blocks from the hotel.

San Antonio has some museums that may be of interest. Collections at the <u>Briscoe Western Art Museum</u> at 210 West Market Street (a couple of blocks from the hotel) highlight the history and cultures of the American West from the Spanish conquest to the present. Roughly six miles from the hotel is the <u>McNay Art Museum</u> with strengths in Medieval and Renaissance art, American and European paintings, sculptures, and photographs. The <u>Institute of Texan Cultures</u> is a great place to learn about the people who have inhabited the area. It is located in HemisFair Park, a short walk from the hotel.

Turn left after exiting the hotel on the River Walk and enjoy a lovely stroll underneath the convention center, through the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México campus with its wonderful public art, and into Hemisfair Park, site of the 1968 World's Fair. Get a ticket to the Tower of the Americas and ride the elevator to the viewing platform for amazing panoramic views of San Antonio.

For gifts made by local artisans, visit <u>La Villita Historic Arts Village</u>, an arts and shopping area with roots back to the 18th century. You won't find any chain stores here.

November should afford perfect weather for wandering around the very walkable city to see the many sites. San Antonio may be the 7th largest city in the U.S., but the River Walk feels quaint. It is the perfect setting for friends to reunite and catch up with one another.



Quorum


A minimum of 35 voting-eligible members must be in attendance for votes to be taken. Failing that, the meeting can be held but votes cannot be taken.

Resolutions

When important issues are before the membership, resolutions are sometimes presented at the members meeting. Resolutions can originate from MESA's Board or from the membership. For resolutions to be acted upon at the 2018 Members Meeting, they must be in the hands of the MESA Secretariat by **November 1, 2018**. International Travelers

Travel Ban

In a June 26, 2018 ruling, the Supreme Court found constitutional Presidential Proclamation 9645. 9645 restricts travel to the U.S. from nationals of five Muslim-majority countries: Iran, Libya, Somalia, Syria and Yemen. Please see the <u>July 20 memo</u> from MESA's Task Force on Civil and Human Rights for further information.

Even with a valid visa, it is important for international travelers to stay abreast of developments. We recommend reading **Know Your Rights: What To Do When Encountering Law Enforcement at Airports and Other Ports of Entry into the U.S.** These helpful tips from the ACLU will serve as a guide to anyone undergoing stringent evaluation at the airport. https://www.aclu.org/know-your-rights/what-do-when-encountering-law-enforcement-airports-and-other-ports-entry-us. The Electronic Frontier Foundation has created a Border Search Pocket Guide that can be printed and carried during travel.

Visa Waiver Program

Changes to the Visa Waiver Program were implemented in November 2015. Changes include new passport requirements (e-passports), the Electronic System of Travel Authorization (ESTA) which all VWP applicants must use, and restrictions on people who have traveled to Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Syria, Sudan, and Yemen since March 1, 2011. If you have traveled to one of those countries you *cannot* travel to the US under the VWP. You will need a visa. https://www.cbp.gov/travel/international-visitors/visa-waiver-program

e-passports

As of April 1, 2016, e-passports are required for those traveling under the VWP. These passports have a machine-readable zone on the biographic page, and a digital chip containing biometric information about the passport owner. https://www.dhs.gov/e-passports

Electronic System for Travel Authorization

The Department of Homeland Security has established the Electronic System for Travel Authorization (ESTA), an automated system to determine eligibility to travel under the VWP. All persons traveling under the VWP must apply for an ESTA. Approved ESTA applications are good for a period of two years. http://www.cbp.gov/travel/international-visitors/esta

As always, we suggest getting everything in order for travel to the US in advance of purchasing airline tickets. We encourage you to read the information on these new programs.

No Show Policy

We understand that things come up at the last minute that prevent a participant from attending the meeting. Please notify MESA if you cannot attend the meeting. If you are scheduled to participate in the annual meeting in any capacity and you don't show up and haven't informed the MESA Secretariat, you will be considered a 'no-show' and will not be eligible to participate in the next year's meeting. A no-show is someone who is not physically present at his/her panel at the conference and hasn't notified the MESA Secretariat beforehand.

Instructions for Paper Presenters

Share your paper with your co-panelists by October 15, 2018

Please upload a copy of your paper to the myMESA system or send a copy via email to your co-panelists, especially the chair/discussant. No one else will be able to view your paper except for your co-panelists. Papers need not be the final copy; drafts are fine. There is no suggested paper length. Your topic and your depth of coverage should determine its length. Plan to present a truncated version of your paper at your panel.

- 1. Log into myMESA (http://mesana.org/mymesa/login.php).
- 2. Click the "Annual Meeting" button.
- 3. Click the "Paper Abstract" button (shows up once you click the annual meeting button).
- 4. Click the "Submit/Update full paper" button.
- 5. Under "Upload your attachment" click the "browse" button.
- 6. Locate the file on your computer by navigating to the directory where the file is located.
- 7. Once the name of your file appears in the box next to the "browse" button, click the "Save and back to abstract" button.
- 8. Your file has now been uploaded.
- 9. Log-out.

2018 FILMFEST

A PREVIEW OF WHAT'S TO COME IN NOVEMBER

With a bit over three months to go until cruising the River Walk, the FilmFest is hard at work. This year our normal sources of material are in a lull, but we still are considering about 150 films. Here are a few titles we are working to have on the schedule.

Couscous: Seeds of Dignity




A vid FilmFest attendees will recall Habib Ayeb's film "Gabes Labess" about efforts to preserve Tunisia's Gabes oasis. This year we will feature Ayeb's new film "Couscous: Seeds of Dignity." Couscous is Tunisia'a staple crop, a dish that embodies hospitality as well as emblematic of cultural identity, dignity and independence. Despite its centrality, couscous is being supplanted by imported processed foods. It has become harder for small landholders to produce enough to feed their families. This lyrical film introduces viewers to couscous and allows local farmers to explain its social as well as alimentary importance and relates food production to Tunisia's political upheaval.

Nowhere to Hide



We have not featured a film on Iraq in several years, since the reduction in U.S. involvement. When the U.S. was preparing to withdraw combat forces in 2011, the film maker trained Iraqi nurse, Nori Saleh, to film aspects of his daily life. The project continued over the next five years. Initially wide-ranging, always with a focus on how Iraqi lives were impacted by the conflict, the episodes become progressively personal as political and security circumstances in Diyala Governorate collapsed. Eventually Nori and his family leave home for temporary shelter, but this becomes a mere layover to their joining others in a refugee camp. This effecting film portrays the ongoing fragility of life in Iraq and the truth of its title, "Nowhere to Hide."

Yemen: Kids and War



It should be well known that Yemen has been in civil war since 2015; the United Nations has said the conflict is the world's worst humanitarian crisis. Yemeni film maker Khadija al-Salami approaches the conflict from a unique perspective. Rather than present images of destruction, she has three children interview people and let them present the daily life of Yemeni besieged by Saudi airstrikes. The novice reporters meet other kids, record the accounts of wounded children and those whose parents have been killed. With the innocence of children, they also interview adults - a painter, a rapper, a model who has become 'Miss War' on social media - and ask them to send a message to those they believe are the only ones who can stop the war - the European Union.

The Feeling of Being Watched

Film maker Assia Boundaoui grew up in an Arab-American community near Chicago, where it was commonly believed that the neighborhood was under FBI surveillance. As a young journalist, she decided to investigate. She uncovered tens of thousands of pages revealing that prior to 9/11 her town was target of "Operation Vulgar Betrayal," to that date the largest counterterrorism investigation in the U.S. This sobering film shows Assia's examination of why the investigation began, why it was kept secret, and her legal challenges to the government's surveillance of her new neighborhood and her family.

You are forgiven if you're a bit burnt out on soccer after the recent World Cup, but the 2020 Women's World Cup will soon be upon us. Middle Eastern nations don't fare well in women's competition but "17" reveals we've not been paying close attention. In 2016 Jordan hosted the Under-17 Women's World Cup and the local entry did well. Widad Shafakoj's film is a nuanced portrayal of the young women contending with family expectations and social norms as they mature and train to represent their country. This is not your typical sports story.



Your Last Walk in the Mosque

Most Americans are unaware that in January 2017 a gunman opened fire in Centre Culturel Islamique de Québec (CCIQ) in Sainte-Foy, Quebec. Six men were killed; nineteen were injured. This was the first attack of its kind at a place of worship on Canadian soThe il. This film details the events of that night through the recollections of the survivors, including from those who were severely injured in the attack or who witnessed the terror unfold. Interviewees share their reflections of loss and trauma.

rowing up in a suburb outside Hartford, Connecticut, I could not claim any particular connection to the Middle East. As a child, I was fascinated by a lavishly illustrated popular edition of 1001 Nights that had found its way onto my parents' bookshelves and I spent many hours poring over it. So I suppose I have to confess that I first entered the world of Middle East studies through one of its more orientalist portals.

During my undergraduate years in the late sixties at Radcliffe/Harvard, my intellectual interests and political activity intersected and gradually came to focus on the region. I was intrigued by comparative religion, and took courses with Wilfred Cantwell Smith whose lectures first introduced me to Islam. As a political philosophy major, I studied and ultimately wrote a senior thesis in the field of Islamic political philosophy, although I would be hard pressed to supply any details.

Much more vivid in my mind are the politics of the time – the campus was roiled by anti-war actions and protests against Harvard as part of the war machine as well as a powerful landlord and unfair employer that despoiled the local community. I joined SDS (Students for a Democratic Society) and began to question much of what I thought I knew about how the world worked, tuning into alternative political analyses coming from the left and from abroad. Early on, at the time of the 1967 war, I listened with astonishment to a Cuban broadcast that explained the Palestinian issue to me for the first time. I suspect I was one of the very few Americans who experienced a political epiphany listening to Radio Havana on the short wave, better known at the time for its hours of rather dull political speeches.

I graduated from college a bit adrift – as for so many of my peers, the old certainties were gone but how to fit ourselves into a different future was less than clear. After a very brief, and quite unsuccessful, stint as a labor organizer, I decided to follow my interests to the region and left for Europe with an inchoate plan to get to the Middle East. I ended up hitchhiking alone from Luxembourg to Greece, and then taking a boat to Beirut – only a privileged citizen of a global empire would think it was a smart way to travel as a young woman of 22. But the gods of naiveté were smiling.

My two years in Beirut were to provide my first real education in the politics and history of the Middle East. I studied

at AUB, taking courses with Hanna Batatu, Mahmud al-Ghul, and Kamal Salibi, all teachers whose depth of knowledge and joy in scholarly pursuits have been lifelong inspirations for me. (I would later study at the PhD level with al-Ghul when he came to Harvard, and Batatu would eventually be a treasured senior colleague at Georgetown.) Outside class I listened to the charged political debates among students – Lebanese from the left and right, Palestinians of various factions, Syrian and Iraqi dissidents, ex-pat Turks and Pakistanis. This was student politics at an entirely different level of intensity and import.

I was also introduced to the complexities of women and gender issues through friendships with strong and generous women from Lebanon, Palestine, and the Gulf. And the city outside the gates of AUB was a microcosm of the region in those years, home to exiles and refugees and intellectuals and students and political tourists from throughout the Middle East and beyond who filled the cafes as well as the pages of an impressive number of publications. So I was now hooked on the region, coming to care deeply about political outcomes but also drawn to its history and culture, impelled to learn more about this splendid place.

After a year in Paris, I returned to graduate school at Harvard (a failure of the imagination perhaps) in the mid-1970s, and a PhD program in History and Middle East Studies. Harvard lacked a tenured historian in Middle East history in those days, but it proved less of a problem that it might have been because Albert Hourani was coming and going from Oxford and took the Middle East history students under his wing. Hourani was a spectacular mentor – knowledgeable, encouraging, incredibly generous with his time, and as such as he has been my elusive model for mentorship over the years.

I had become interested in women's history, which was gaining a foothold in academia although still almost completely absent from the Middle East field. Fatima Mernissi and Nawal al-Saadawi published path-breaking books on women's issues in the early years of my graduate career, both of which sounded a clarion call for more research and encouraged younger scholars in various fields to engage. Hourani didn't blink when I told him I wanted to work on women in Egypt, and he even made me feel that he welcomed the opportunity to explore the contours of a new field. My dissertation took shape as a study

of women in nineteenth century Egypt with a focus on political economy. While looking for materials in Egypt, I was led to the Islamic court records from Cairo and the provinces, which were, at that time, a virtually untapped source for social and economic history. Much of my subsequent work on women's and gender history drew on these records from Egypt and later from Palestine and Syria, and eventually I came to the study of a wider variety of Islamic legal materials as critical to writing the history of gender in the Middle East at both the discursive and material levels.

The development of a critical current in Middle East studies added an important dimension to my years as a graduate student. I had joined the Middle East Research and Information Project (MERIP) when I returned to Cambridge, MA for graduate school and the MERIP collective became an important community for me. I helped produce *MERIP Reports* – writing, proofreading, typesetting as we all did –and occasionally staffed the office in a church basement. In 1975, I collaborated with another member of the collective to research and write a long piece on Middle East studies, its history in the U.S. and above all its ties to U.S. policy and oil interests. I think this might be a good exercise for anyone embarking on graduate study: begin by writing an exposé of your chosen field.

Some critical intellectual initiatives in the field, the Hull group that published the *Review of Middle East Studies* in the UK and, in the US, the Alternative Middle East Studies Seminar in which I participated, were important venues for mounting intellectual challenges to the strains of orientalism and modernization theory that still dominated the field. I have vivid memories of an informal discussion a group of us graduate students had with Edward Said around that time, and first hearing some of the ideas that would later take such elegant form in his Orientalism.

I was hired as an assistant professor at Georgetown University in 1983. The Department of History was, and still is, unusual in its strong embrace of history as a global enterprise and the Americanists do not dominate as elsewhere. I joined two other historians of the region, John Ruedy (modern North Africa) and Hisham Sharabi (Arab and European intellectual), and an impressive community of doctoral students in History who were, and continue to be, producing path-breaking work on the history of the region. Georgetown had made a decision to develop its strengths in the study of the Arab World before I arrived, and the Center for Contemporary Arab Studies (CCAS) became an important second home for me with many wonderful colleagues - anthropologists, political scientists, and Arabic literature experts, not to mention the pleasure of teaching exceptional M.A. students. I have also had opportunities along the way to teach abroad – at the American University in Cairo where I collaborated closely with my colleague and good friend Cynthia Nelson, and at the Georgetown campus in Qatar where I learned much about the Arab Gulf from my students. As we all know, where you are employed as an academic is largely a matter of luck, of timing, of fit - all matters outside our control - so that I feel extraordinarily fortunate that I landed where I did.

I found my professional home in MESA. I have attended the annual meetings fairly religiously over the years. Historians of the Middle East were always thick on the ground and I could reconnect with my teachers, my friends from graduate school, language programs and research travel, and, in the fullness of time, former students - MESA meetings were also fun and there are not that many opportunities to dance with your colleagues. I feel privileged to have served on the MESA Board early on. Editing IJMES for five years was one of the great intellectual adventures of my life as I read and reflected on voluminous pages of new research coming out of our field. Now, as MESA's president, I am gratified to be able to help carry out the missions of upholding standards of scholarly excellence, professional conduct, and academic freedom at home and in the Middle East region. I did not anticipate much of this – when I was a graduate student MESA appeared to me to be a pretty stodgy organization run by a coterie of older men, not my place at all. I like to think MESA has changed in some rather dramatic ways - and not just that I have become part of a coterie of stodgy older women!

My professional life in Middle East Studies got intertwined with my personal life, as I think transpires with many of us. I met my husband Sharif Elmusa (political scientist and poet), in graduate school in the very basement where I did MERIP work. I have since become happily integrated into a large Palestinian family and mother to two Arab-American children, now young adults, Karmah and Layth. Over the years I have developed deep friendships with women in Egypt, Palestine, and Qatar, and been invited into their social and intellectual circles. Although I cannot claim that my life has been shaped in every particular by my blunder into Middle East studies, I am eternally grateful that it happened.

MESA's Committee on Academic Freedom continues to address record numbers of cases. While the number of academics arrested and dismissed in Turkey has declined, those who were previously arrested are now facing trial. In the meantime, the number of cases in Gulf states, particularly the UAE, has increased, while in Iran a disturbing number of dual nationals have been detained. At the same time the Israeli government has threatened deportation and blacklisting of those advocating the BDS (boycott, divestment, and sanctions) movement. This panel draws on expertise from both inside and outside of CAF membership. One presentation will discuss the Gulf, where conditions for open inquiry in the Gulf have narrowed sharply with new decrees and legislation that have created ambiguity and uncertainty for scholars and students alike. Another presentation, drawing on several MENA country experiences, will examine the need for us as academics to go beyond solidarity work to engage in building a movement and a road map toward creation of transnational academic rights through revisiting various international conventions. A third presentation will examine the restrictions on academic freedoms and the re-organization of higher education in the context of regime building in Turkey. In the final presentation, the presenter will discuss her own detention and deportation from Israel and how it relates to larger threats to academic freedom in Israel and in Palestine. The panel will thus provide an important opportunity for MESA members to learn more, not only about CAF's work, but also about the broader context in which our colleagues who are on the front lines of these battles both in MENA and North America are struggling to assert their rights to academic freedom.

Lahab Assef Al-Jundi was born and raised in Damascus, Syria and lives in San Antonio. He received a degree in electrical engineering from the University of Texas at Austin. He published his first poetry collection, "A Long Way", in 1985. His poetry has appeared in numerous literary publications, and many anthologies including: "In These Latitudes, Ten Contemporary Poets", edited by Robert Bonazzi, "Inclined to Speak, An Anthology of Contemporary Arab American Poetry", edited by Hayan Charara, and "Between Heaven and Texas", edited by Naomi Shihab Nye. His poems were selected in 2009 and 2010, by The Poetry Society of America, for display on Dallas' DART trains (Poetry In Motion Program), and on San Antonio's VIA Transit system buses (Poetry On The Move Program). His latest poetry collection "No Faith At All" was published in 2014 by Pecan Grove Press.

Sharif S. Elmusa is a scholar, poet, and writer. As a scholar, he authored and edited many books and articles on politics and culture of the environment in the Middle East. As a poet, Elmusa is co-editor of *Grape Leaves*: A *Century of Arab American Poetry*, and author of the poetry collection *Flawed Landscape*. His poems and poetry translations from Arabic appeared in numerous anthologies, magazines, and online publications. He contributed essays and opinion pieces to a number of international publications in Egypt, India, and the United States. Elmusa, who holds a Ph.D. from M.I.T, was the recipient of several scholarly awards, including a Fulbright Fellowship in Jerusalem, Palestine, and a Coca-Cola Fellowship at Yale University. He taught at the American University in Cairo in the Political Science Department for many years, and also at Georgetown University in Qatar, and Yale. He is Palestinian by birth, American by citizenship.

Ignacio Magaloni received his MA in English from the University of Texas at Austin in 1999. He is a member of the Macondo Writers Workshop, appears in the anthology of Texas poets and painters "Is This Forever or What?" edited by Naomi Shihab Nye in addition to other anthologies. Magaloni teaches literature and creative writing at Northwest Vista College.

Naomi Shihab Nye was born in St. Louis, Missouri. Her father was a Palestinian refugee and her mother an American of German and Swiss descent, and Nye spent her adolescence in both Jerusalem and San Antonio. She earned her BA from Trinity University in San Antonio. Nye is the recipient of numerous honors and awards for her work, including a Lavan Award, the Paterson Poetry Prize, the Carity Randall Prize, and many Pushcart Prizes. She has received fellowships from the Lannan Foundation, the Guggenheim Foundation, and she was a Witter Bynner Fellow. From 2010 to 2015 she served as a Chancellor of the Academy of American Poets.

Carmen Tafolla is one of the most anthologized of Latina writers. She has published work for both children and adults in more than two hundred anthologies, magazines, journals, textbooks, and readers. Long considered one of the madrinas of Chicana Literature and a master of bilingual code-switching, Tafolla is the author of more than twenty books and the recipient of the Americas Award, two Tomas Rivera Book Awards, the Charlotte Zolotow Award for Best Children's Picture Book of 2010, and the Art of Peace Award, for writing which furthers peace, justice, and human understanding. Tafolla served as the Poet Laureate of San Antonio from 2012 to 2014, and was named the Poet Laureate of Texas for 2015-16. She is professor of Transformative Children's Literature at the University of Texas at San Antonio.

Natalia Trevino was born in Mexico City and raised in San Antonio. She spoke Spanish with her parents while Bert and Ernie gave her English lessons on the side. Natalia is an Associate Professor of English at Northwest Vista College and a member of the Macondo Foundation, a writer's workshop aimed at encouraging non-violent social change. She graduated from UTSA's graduate English program and has an MFA in creative writing from the University of Nebraska. Her poetry has won the Alfredo Moral de Cisneros Award for Emerging Writers from Sandra Cisneros, the Wendy Barker Creative Writing Award, the 2008 Dorothy Sargent Rosenberg Poetry Prize, and the San Antonio Artists Foundation Literary Award.
