## **Additional information regarding the sessions**

### **Methodology support groups**

This session will offer the participants to get some invaluable feedback and insights on their work. We would kindly ask everyone to prepare a very short summary or problematisation of the current phase of your project that you wish to discuss. It can be a study design; you can bring some of your data and share it with the group, or discuss how to build theory on the basis of the analysis. We will form small groups based on the phase of your research and the topic of your thesis.

Within groups, participants will take turns in presenting. Short presentations will be followed by discussions on the specific questions related to the presented project. Finally, groups will attempt to articulate some questions or ideas that relate to research in general, which will be shared in a plenary discussion.

### **Presentations of PhD projects**

There will be two 20 minute presentations of PhD projects, each followed by a 20 minute discussion.

### **Sociocultural challenge: Charting the future of our field**

Sociocultural psychology is being pushed to the fringes of academic institutions and lacks recognition in the public sphere. We will attempt to address issues facing sociocultural psychology today, such as where should we set our disciplinary boundaries? How should we engage with the public, the private sector, NGOs? Do we need to become more mainstream to survive or keep defining our field in opposition to the mainstream psychology? How should we act going forward?
